Introduction and special features

This three-year degree in Japanese & Intercultural Communication – which includes a year or semester in Japan – gives you the skills you need to work in Japan or in an international professional context. The programme is designed to give you communicative Japanese language skills, a deep understanding of Japanese culture, the ability to communicate interculturally, and insight into different sociocultural language practices. You'll study how language relates to speakers' intentions and purposes in social interaction, social attitudes to language, and the way language choices can express identities and cultural values. This programme is ideal for you if you feel confident studying in Japan after just one year of university study.

Special features:

- Start Japanese from beginners or with prior study. On arrival at York St John University you will be placed at an appropriate level, either Accelerated Japanese 1 or Japanese Communication 1.
- Study abroad without adding an extra year to your degree go to Japan during level 5.
- Take the Japanese Language Proficiency Test for no extra fee at level 6.
- Take part in extra-curricular activities related to Japanese language and culture: the
 vibrant student-run Japanese Society, where you can experience Japanese culture and
 meet home and exchange students, and the staff-led taiko drumming group, where you
 can learn a new skill and practice intercultural understanding.
- Access specialist spaces for students: a Linguistics Lab, Languages Workshop, Lounge and Study.

Admissions criteria

You must meet the University's general entry criteria for undergraduate study.

You can enter this programme as a beginner in Japanese. You can also enter if you have studied Japanese before and/or if you have any qualifications in Japanese.

The programme is not suitable if Japanese is your first language, or if you have C1 level of the Common European Framework for Languages (CEFR) in Japanese

If your first language is not English, you need to take an IELTS test or an equivalent qualification accepted by the University (see https://www.yorksj.ac.uk/international/how-to-apply/english-language-requirements/).

If you do not have traditional qualifications, you may be eligible for entry on the basis of <u>Accredited Prior (Experiential) Learning (APL/APEL)</u>. We also consider applications for entry with advanced standing.

Programme aims

By the end of the programme, successful students will reach upper B2/C1 Independent/Proficient User level on the JF standard for Japanese language education. You will be able to have conversations, give presentations, join in discussions, read articles and reports, and write coherently, communicating effectively for a range of academic, social and professional purposes. You will have both theoretical expertise and real-life experience in intercultural communication, enabling you to work in Japan or in an international professional context.

In special circumstances where the students are not able to go to Study Abroad due to external factors (e.g. virus pandemic, war, political conflict), students will be consulted and may be able stay on this programme without going to Study Abroad. In this case, students will take the 2nd year (level 5) modules listed above at York St John University both in Semester 1 and Semester 2.

Please note that not all options will be available every year as they depend on student demand and staff availability.

Exemptions for modules

- 1. Work experience modules
 - There may be some circumstances where an exemption is appropriate from the work experience module. Alternative modules may be offered in this situation at the discretion of the University. Modules exceptionally taken in this situation will normally be:
 - 2LL318 Language at Work (Distance) is replaced by 2LL320 World Englishes
 (Distance) or a host institution module.
 - o 2LL306 Language at Work is replaced by any other optional module
- 2. Distance modules while abroad

While Studying Abroad students take Japanese language modules and also modules, taught in English or Japanese, that are relevant to the Intercultural Communication / TESOL side of the programme. If insufficient Intercultural communication / TESOL or related modules are available at the host institution, the following modules are taken instead:

Learning, teaching and assessment

Japanese

You can enter this programme if you are a complete beginner or if you have studied Japanese before. On arrival at York St John University your Japanese level will be tested using a placement test. You will be placed at an appropriate level, either Accelerated Japanese 1 or Japanese Communication 1. Japanese Communication 1 is designed for students who have studied Japanese before and/or who have a qualification in Japanese.

We use a communicative Japanese teaching style at level 4, teaching speaking and listening through tasks such as pair-work and group work. Reading and writing input includes focus on independent learning strategies. At level 5 you will study Japanese language and culture, as well as modules relating to the Intercultural Communication side of your programme, at a host university in Japan. Our level 6 Japanese language project modules use content-and-language integrated learning – you will study aspects of Japanese cultures, communities and societies through the medium of Japanese. You will learn through individual and/or group presentations, reading and discussion of authentic texts, and formative feedback on writing. You are expected to proactively engage with the language outside of class time at all levels.

Japanese modules are assessed with a combination of oral exam, videos, class tests and written work which varies according to the module. In addition, if you wish you can take the Japanese Language Proficiency Test for no extra fee at level 6.

We also provide opportunities for you to take part in extra-curricular activities related to Japanese language and culture: the vibrant student-run Japanese Society, where you can experience Japanese culture and meet home and exchange students, and the staff-led taiko drumming group, where you can learn a new skill and practice intercultural understanding.

Intercultural Communication

Intercultural Communication modules are delivered using a mixture of lectures, workshops and seminars. Academic and research skills are embedded in modules, for example, academic writing and referencing, peer review, use of web based resources for document sharing, and the use of wikis and blogs. The assessment varies from module to module. Assessment methods include essays, presentations, data analysis, peer reviews, blog posts and research proposals and reports.

Study Abroad and Work Experience

Study abroad for at least one semester is compulsory during level 5. You will take Japanese language classes at your host university. You will also take courses, either taught in English or in Japanese, which are relevant to the Intercultural communication side of your degree. Both your Japanese and your Intercultural communication courses will be assessed by the host institution, and the grades will be converted to York St John University credits.

You will also take a work experience module at level 5, either 2LL306 Language at Work or 2LL318 Language at Work (Distance). This module addresses the University commitment to ensuring that graduates of York St John have worked towards the development of their own post-graduation careers. As such, this module includes 10 days of work experience as arranged by students. In addition, given the fundamental importance of language and communication in any working organisation, the module will consider relevant issues and practices within places of work.

Level 6

Level 6 modules challenge you to investigate and critically evaluate socio-cultural and/or political contexts of language use through independent study. You learn research and academic literacy skills across both Japanese and Intercultural Communication modules, enabling you to construct a convincing argument, evidenced by critical engagement with appropriate sources, both orally and in writing, and in both English and Japanese. In the 40-credit dissertation module you conduct an independent research study of relevance to your programme, drawing on the research skills you have learned throughout the programme, and supported by additional skills sessions and up to six hours of one-on-one supervision.

Progression and graduation requirements

The University's general regulations for undergraduate awards apply to this programme.

Any modules that must be passed for progression or award are indicated in the Programme Structure section.

In addition, the following programme-specific regulations apply in respect of progression and graduation.

The opportunity to study abroad is a privilege and approval will be given during level 4 subject to meeting the following criteria:

- 1. At least 80% attendance in Japanese modules, and across all six level 4 semester 1 and semester 2 modules.
- 2. At least 60% attendance across all three level 4 semester 1 modules (any lower than this means that meeting criteria 1 would not be possible by the end of semester 2).
- **3.** A pass on all level 4 modules (after resit(s) where applicable).
- 4. At least a serious attempt (a mark of 20 or above) on all level 4 semester 1 modules at first attempt.
- 5. No concerns have arisen under the Fitness to Study Policy that would prevent you from studying abroad.
- **6.** No breaches of the York St John Code of Discipline.
- **7.** Acceptance by a host institution.

In exceptional cases, if a student is not deemed suitable for study abroad, the Subject Director in consultation with the Head of School may not approve it. If you have otherwise met the requirements to progress to level 5, but have not met the criteria for study abroad, it will usually be possible to transfer to a course which does not contain a study abroad element, most likely Language & Communication Studies, or alternatively, to the four-year programme Japanese, Intercultural & Contemporary Communication.
