# Using the Active and Passive Voice

Study Development Factsheet

During your university studies, you may encounter various writing styles. Mastering the ability to adjust tone and formality to suit the context is a valuable skill, which can be achieved by using either an active or passive voice in your sentences.

### The Active Voice

The active voice is the most frequently used in writing and you may use it for introductions, discussions or when conducting critical analysis. Here are some examples of sentences in the active voice:

- The researcher interviewed 40 HR professionals.
- I placed the beaker on the scales.

In this structure, the subject (the doer) is at the start of the sentence, and the object is placed after the verb.

|            | Subject        | Verb        | Object                 | Preposition<br>(where) |
|------------|----------------|-------------|------------------------|------------------------|
| Sentence 1 | The researcher | interviewed | 40 HR<br>professionals |                        |
| Sentence 2 | I              | placed      | the beaker             | on the scales          |

#### When to use the active voice

- To emphasise the subject of the sentence.
- To assign ownership to an action.
- To establish an engaging and personal tone.
- To be concise and direct.

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## The Passive Voice

The passive voice is frequently used in academic writing, especially when writing reports. It is effective in focusing on a process, such as a methods section or a scientific report. Here are some examples of sentences in the passive voice:

- 40 HR professionals were interviewed.
- The beaker was placed on the scales.

In this structure, the subject (the doer) is omitted, and the object is placed at the beginning of the sentence.

|            | Object              | Verb             |
|------------|---------------------|------------------|
| Sentence 1 | 40 HR professionals | were interviewed |
| Sentence 2 | The beaker          | was placed       |

### When to use the passive voice

- When the subject is unknown.
- To create an impersonal tone.
- To emphasise an action or result.
- To create a formal and objective tone.
