Introduction and special features

The LLM Law programme at York St John University is designed to offer postgraduate students an intellectually rigorous and professionally relevant legal education one that is ambitious in its academic standards, flexible in its structure, and deeply attentive to the individual student. At its heart, the programme is built on a simple but powerful conviction: that law is most meaningfully studied when it is connected to the world it governs.

The LLM Law is underpinned by the core values of York St John University, particularly its commitment to social justice, inclusion, sustainability, and positive social change. These values are embedded throughout the curriculum, encouraging you to critically examine the role of law in promoting fairness, accountability, equality, and access to justice. The programme offers a range of specialist modules that enable you to tailor your studies to your interests and career aspirations. Depending on the modules selected, you may explore issues relating to corporate responsibility, consumer rights, environmental sustainability, ethical decision-making, governance and accountability, intellectual property, or the balance between security and individual freedoms. Across these areas, you will be encouraged to consider the wider social, ethical, and environmental implications of legal rules and policies, recognising that legal decisions often have profound

consequences for individuals, communities, and society. By engaging with diverse legal perspectives and contemporary challenges, you will develop advanced legal knowledge alongside the analytical, ethical, and reflective skills needed to contribute responsibly to legal practice, policymaking, research, and wider social debates.

The most distinctive feature of the programme is its work-related learning model, which runs through the programme and gives the curriculum its defining character. You will be exposed to organisations or businesses with legal problems or challenges, and you will be expected to work with these stakeholders to resolve a legal problem or challenge. You will then immerse yourselves in the relevant law and legal principles, studying not in the abstract but in direct response to a legal issue or challenge. At the end, you will present your research and proposed solutions back to that organisation, using a range of professional mediums.

This model does several important things simultaneously. It develops the analytical habits that serious legal study demands, close reading, careful reasoning, the ability to navigate complexity and uncertainty. But it also builds the professional skills that employers value most: structured communication, confident presentation, collaborative problem-solving, and the ability to translate complex legal ideas into clear, actionable recommendations for a non-specialist audience. Across the programme, you will engage with this cycle repeatedly and in different contexts, gradually building fluency and confidence in both the legal and professional dimensions of the work. The cumulative effect is a graduate who is not only legally knowledgeable but professionally capable and ready.

The programme is structured to give you genuine ownership of your learning. Across the two semesters, you will select optional modules that reflect your own interests and professional ambitions, allowing the programme to be genuinely tailored rather than merely described as such. Running alongside these modules throughout the full academic year is the Capstone Project which pairs you with an industry partner who sets a real-world legal problem for investigation and resolution. You will synthesise your prior learning through an in-depth, supervised research project that integrates doctrinal legal analysis, applied problem-solving, and elements of professional practice.

Together, the optional modules and the Capstone Project ensure that you develop both breadth and depth: the breadth to engage confidently with a range of legal issues and contexts, and the depth to demonstrate genuine expertise in an area that matters to them.

The programme is designed with the individual student firmly in mind. Teaching is delivered by a dedicated team of academics and legal professionals who are committed not only to intellectual rigour but to genuine pastoral care. Class sizes and a culture of attentiveness mean that students are known, not as numbers, but as people with backgrounds, interests, and goals and supported accordingly.

This ethos extends into the wider student experience. You will join a close-knit law school community, benefit from careers advice and professional development opportunities woven throughout your studies and have access to subsidised field trips to legal institutions that bring the landscape of the profession to life. The programme takes seriously its responsibility not just to educate but to prepare to send you into the world with the knowledge, skills, networks, and confidence to thrive.

- 7.7 Demonstrate advanced research methodology skills necessary to transfer learning acquired through taught modules to produce an extensive piece of independent research which evaluates a specific issue in private or public law and results in coherent arguments and reasoned conclusions.

Learning, teaching and assessment

You will be taught through a range of interactive, student-centred teaching methods designed to develop both core knowledge and applied understanding through active participation. These may include workshops, short lectures, seminars, case-based learning sessions, problem-solving activities, and group discussions, depending on the nature of the topic being studied. Each module is typically delivered through a weekly three-hour session. You will be expected to undertake advance preparation, such as completing guided readings or set tasks, which will inform and support in-class activities. Sessions are designed to be participatory and may include discussion, case study analysis, applied problem-solving exercises, group work, and presentations. Teaching is facilitated by your tutor, who will guide discussion, clarify key concepts, and support you in applying legal and theoretical knowledge to practical and real-world contexts. These sessions provide opportunities to develop critical thinking, communication, and analytical skills, while also enabling you to learn collaboratively with your peers and test your understanding in a supportive environment. Interactive tools such as Mentimeter, Padlets, Moodle discussion sites, may also be used to encourage anonymous contributions and allow tutors to monitor and respond to your developing understanding in real time. You will also take part in fortnightly one-hour small-group Problem-based Learning (PBL) tutorials that simulate a professional working environment. An industry partner provides a genuine organisational context within which you will investigate a real-world scenario, developing your problem-solving, research, and negotiation abilities. The outcomes of this work feed directly into an assessed element that requires you to report your findings back to the partner, strengthening your written and verbal communication and presentation skills throughout the programme.

Substantive law will be studied within an academic framework while you simultaneously gain exposure to live client work through the York St John Law/Business Clinic. This blended approach allows you to develop legal skills in a real-world setting and to reflect critically on law as it operates in practice. Practical, clinical, and research competencies are woven into every module, ensuring you graduate with both strong theoretical foundations and meaningful applied professional experience.

A Capstone Project runs throughout your time on the programme, matching each student with an industry partner who presents a genuine legal problem for investigation and resolution. Drawing on everything you have learned, you will undertake a closely supervised research project that combines doctrinal legal analysis, applied problem-solving, and elements of professional practice. Working from the partner's brief, you will develop a suitable research design, apply relevant methodologies, and produce a solution demonstrating both advanced legal knowledge and transferable professional skills.

In your first semester, weekly two-hour workshops will introduce the theory and practice of research methodology and design, helping you identify the most appropriate approach and plan your project effectively. In your second semester, fortnightly three-hour workshops provide more focused and hands-on support as you carry out your research and begin analysing your findings, complemented by eight hours of individual supervision from an academic with expertise in your chosen area.

As part of your learning experience, the programme incorporates field trips designed to complement your academic study and provide practical, work-related insights. These visits may include courts, law firms, regulatory bodies, commercial organisations, and, for students specialising in international business and commercial law, organisations involved in cross-border trade, arbitration, and commercial dispute resolution. Field trips offer an opportunity to observe legal and business processes in real-world settings, engage with practitioners, and see how theory is applied in practice. They provide a unique form of experiential learning, enabling you to develop professional skills, critically reflect on legal and commercial practices, and contextualise your learning within practical, global, and interdisciplinary environments. By participating in these visits, you will enhance your understanding of the professional landscape, strengthen analytical and reflective skills, and gain practical insight that supports your academic development and future career readiness.

You will encounter a varied range of assessments designed to be educationally meaningful and skills focused. Essays support independent inquiry and the development of reasoned critical argument, portfolios allow you to apply knowledge practically as each topic unfolds, and presentations require you to demonstrate your abilities in a professionally relevant setting.

Formative feedback opportunities are built into every assessment in every module, reflecting our commitment to developmental support leading into summative work. For the Capstone Project specifically, you will be matched with an appropriately qualified member of academic staff who will guide and support you throughout. Two dedicated assessment workshops are also scheduled within each module to explain requirements, offer guidance, and provide formative feedback on your progress.

Beyond academic support, you will be assigned a personal tutor who will get to know you and your ambitions, monitor your overall development, and offer pastoral advice and guidance throughout your studies.
