Introduction and special features

The BA(Hons) Politics, Philosophy and Economics is designed to help students develop an awareness of the impact of society on our lives through everyday events and occurrences. Modules have been designed in such a way as to assist us in debating problems that arise (or are solved) through ideological decision making and what influences modern day thinking. The programme is influenced heavily by the foundation of York St John University's commitment to equality and social justice while also mirroring York Business School's commitment to PRIME (Principles of Responsible Management Education). As such the programme is uniquely delivered by a team committed to ensuring practice is borne through the affective domain of changing and influencing behaviours for the good of society.

This programme will provide you with a firm understanding of the key debates that face us in society today with the ability to view them from philosophical, political and economic lenses. With a specific focus of this

programme on a range applied problems we face today, you will develop a solid knowledge of underpinning foundations for society.

BA (Hons) Politics, Philosophy and Economics has been designed to deliver practical skills to enhance your employability in a range of careers, in areas such as international governance, politics and economics.

Aligned with our Work-Related Experiential Learning framework, this programme has been designed to deliver predominantly practical skills embedded into your learning and assessment to enhance your employability in a range of roles. Example of activities include – evaluation of economic opportunities and threats for local businesses. You will receive feedback from practitioners on your skills which will enable you to further reflect on your career options.

If you are studying on the BA (Hons) Politics, Philosophy and Economics with placement variant you will undertake a Year in Industry (also known as a sandwich year or placement year), in between your second and third year.

Continuing Professional Development

You are strongly encouraged to undertake Continuing Professional Development throughout your studies to prepare you for the world of work. You will be able to develop a range of academic and professional skills through a range of activities, exercises and events under the guise of 'Success Lab' which will help you to progress through the course and into the job market and provide the work-based skills employers require.

Study Abroad

You have the opportunity (subject to meeting the University Threshold Standards) to undertake a semester or full year abroad² as part of your studies during your second year.

Learning, teaching and assessment

All modules are delivered utilising a range of teaching, learning and assessment strategies including lectures, seminars, live projects, guest speakers, tutorials, practical sessions, workshops and a range of events and learning activities.

² If you are taking the placement award you are only eligible for one semester abroad.

You are supported initially in the use of guided learning strategies in Level 4 developing towards autonomous, well-judged use of collaborative and independent learning strategies in Levels 5 and 6.

Throughout the programme you will be introduced to a range of different teaching and learning strategies. This will help you in developing your awareness of market forces, investment analysis and the decision-making process you may require in future roles. At Level 5 (for example) you will learn how to analyse different current issues in the economic environment in Industrial Economics. This involves case-based learning in which you will be expected to engage in case-based activities as you develop your skills, while also developing skills in managing projects (Research Methods). Finally, at Level 6 (for example) you will demonstrate your skills through practice and enquiry-based learning giving you the opportunity to develop creative and innovative solutions to problems through Beyond Economics.

You will undertake a variety of assessments which include the use of written assignments (often in the form of reports), individual and group presentations, exams and tests, and practical activities. An essential part of the assessment is to encourage both learning and the development of skills as well as preparing you for the requirements of the workplace.

You will have opportunities for formative assessment and feedback to inform your work prior to submission and you will receive detailed feedback on assessments to help you develop and continuously improve your performance whilst on the programme. Advice will be provided in relation to development, further areas for research and guidance on how to enhance your knowledge of Politics, Philosophy and Economics.

You will have the opportunity for study support including academic writing, research skills and interview skills to enhance employability and career development in the field of Politics, Philosophy and Economics.
