Introduction and special features

The British Sign Language and Deaf Studies programme offers you the chance to partake in an in-depth study of the history, language and cultures of deaf people, combined with broader study of language structure and use, as well as providing an opportunity to learn British Sign Language to an advanced level. The course draws on contemporary research, some of which will be your lecturers', to explore the experiences of deaf people and communities in both historical and contemporary contexts.

Special features:

- Start British Sign Language from beginners or with prior study. On arrival at York St John University you will be placed at an appropriate level, either British Sign Language Beginners 1 or Intermediate 1.
- Take a nationally recognised Signature British Sign Language qualification, included in the tuition fee. This is valuable if you wish to continue working with deaf people upon graduation.
- Take part in collaborative staff and student community engagement programmes: Sign Bar, where you can engage with the deaf community and communicate using British Sign Language, and Hearing Dogs for the Deaf where you can organise and participate in fundraising activities and events.

- Access specialist spaces for students: a Linguistics Lab, Languages Workshop, Lounge and Study.
- Learn about current research issues and methods from guest lecturers in our Colloquium Series on a variety of topics related to programmes in the School of Language and Linguistics.
- Apply to join the University's Students-as-Researchers scheme or present your dissertation research at ULAB, the Undergraduate Linguistics Association of Britain conference.

Admissions criteria

You must meet the University's general entry criteria for [undergraduate](#) study.

You can enter this programme as a beginner in British Sign Language. You can also enter if you already have Signature level 1.

This programme is not suitable if British Sign Language is your first language, or if you have Signature level 3 or above.

If you have Signature level 2, then you can enter the programme, but the British Sign Language modules in the first three semesters (British Sign Language Intermediate 1–3) will contain some element of revision.

If your first language is not English, you need to take an IELTS test or an equivalent qualification accepted by the University (see <https://www.yorks.ac.uk/international/how-to-apply/english-language-requirements/>).

If you do not have traditional qualifications, you may be eligible for entry on the basis of [Accredited Prior \(Experiential\) Learning \(APL/APEL\)](#). We also consider applications for entry with advanced standing.

Programme aim(s)

By the end of this programme, you will be an independent user of BSL (CEFR level B2), and will be at a standard where you will be able to take your Signature Level 3 BSL awards if you wish. You will understand the main issues faced by Deaf people from historical and social perspectives, and have an appreciation of how to conduct ethical and effective research with Deaf people and communities.

Learning, teaching and assessment

British Sign Language

You can enter this programme if you are a complete beginner or if you have studied British Sign Language before. On arrival at York St John University you will be placed at an appropriate level. If you already have Signature level 1 or 2 or equivalent British Sign Language proficiency you will start at Enhanced British Sign Language 1. If not, you will start at Accelerated British Sign Language 1. You will progress to the next level as follows: Accelerated 1 is followed by Accelerated 2; Enhanced 1 is followed by Enhanced 2.

As you progress through the programme topics will broaden, starting with routine and familiar matters at level 4. At level 5 topics will include the appropriate register for teaching children, young people and adults, question forms, vocabulary relevant to primary, secondary, further and higher education and Lifelong Learning Teaching skills in the BSL Education module. For the BSL Employment module topics will include Deaf people's rights in the workplace (e.g. Access to Work, Equalities Act), vocabulary for different careers/jobs, translation skills and using communicative technology (e.g. Skype) effectively with deaf people. The BSL modules will be assessed through conversation, video and micro teaching. At level 6, the BSL for Recreational Activities module will include using filming technology in informal environments, traditional Deaf social/recreational information, Deaf people's access to mainstream recreational activities and vocabulary relating to social/recreational activities. The BSL for Mental and Physical Health module will include Vocabulary for mental health how to describe body parts, vocabulary for common diseases and further translation skills.

In addition, if you wish you can elect to take the nationally recognised Signature British Sign Language qualifications during level 6 for no additional fee. This is valuable if you wish to continue working with deaf people upon graduation.

We encourage students to join the student-run British Sign Language Society. We also provide opportunities for extra-curricular involvement in collaborative staff and student community engagement programmes: Sign Bar, where you can engage with the deaf community and communicate using British Sign Language, and Hearing Dogs for the Deaf where you can organise and participate in fundraising activities and events.

Deaf Studies

Deaf Studies modules are delivered using a mixture of lectures, workshops and seminars. Academic and research skills are embedded in modules, for example, academic writing and referencing, peer review, use of web-based resources for document sharing, and the use of wikis and blogs. The assessment varies from module to module. Assessment methods include essays, signed or spoken presentations, data analysis, online tests, peer reviews, blog posts and research proposals and reports.

Level 6

Level 6 modules challenge you to investigate and critically evaluate socio-cultural, political or historical contexts relevant to deaf lives and/or the structure or use of British Sign Language through independent study.

You learn research and academic literacy skills across both British Sign Language and Deaf Studies modules, enabling you to construct a convincing argument, evidenced by critical engagement with appropriate sources, in both English and British Sign Language. In the 40-credit dissertation module you conduct an independent research study of relevance to your programme, drawing on the research skills you have learned throughout the programme, and supported by additional skills sessions and up to six hours of one-on-one supervision.

In addition, if you wish you can elect to take a nationally recognised Signature British Sign Language qualification during level 6 for no additional fee. This is valuable if you wish to continue working with deaf people upon graduation.
