Introduction and special features

This four-year degree in Korean, English Language & Linguistics – which includes a year in Korea – combines Korean language study with the study of how language is structured and used. The programme is designed to give you communicative Korean language skills and a deep understanding of Korean culture. You'll study how we convey meaning, how language varies according to speaker and situation, the position of English in the multilingual world, and social, political and ideological issues in language and education. This programme is ideal if you would like to choose from a diverse range of English Language & Linguistics modules.

Special features:

- Start Korean from beginners no need to have studied Korean, or any other language, before
- Study abroad between level 5 and level 6 study Korean for two years before going abroad
- Take the CELTA (Certificate in English Language Teaching to Speakers of Other Languages), the internationally-recognised English language teaching qualification awarded by Cambridge Assessment English, part of the University of Cambridge, subject to successful interview take this for no extra fee, during the summer or up to a year after you graduate
- Access specialist spaces for students: a Linguistics Lab, Languages Workshop, Lounge and Study.
- Learn about current research issues and methods from guest lecturers in our Colloquium Series on a variety of topics related to programmes in Language and Linguistics.

• Apply to join the University's Students-as-Researchers scheme or present your dissertation research at ULAB, the Undergraduate Linguistics Association of Britain conference.

Admissions criteria

You must meet the minimum entry requirements which are published on the programme specific webpage.

You can enter this programme as a beginner in Korean.

The programme is not suitable if Korean is your first language, if you have an A level in Korean, or if you have B1 level or above of the Common European Framework for Languages (CEFR) in Korean.

If your first language is not English, you need to take an IELTS test or an equivalent qualification accepted by the University (see https://www.yorksj.ac.uk/international/how-to-apply/english-language-requirements/).

If you do not have traditional qualifications, you may be eligible for entry on the basis of <u>Accredited Prior</u> (<u>Experiential</u>) <u>Learning (APL/APEL</u>). We also consider applications for entry with advanced standing.

Programme aim(s)

By the end of the programme, successful students will reach B2/C1 level on the Common European Framework for Languages (CEFR) in Korean. You will be able to have conversations, give presentations, join in discussions, read articles and reports, and write coherently, communicating effectively for a range of academic, social and professional purposes. You will have the skills to be an independent and ethical (applied) linguist, able to work for social justice in changing global contexts by drawing on sound evidence from linguistic theories and applied linguistics practice.

Learning, teaching and assessment

Korean

This programme is designed for beginners in Korean. We use a communicative Korean teaching style at level 4, teaching speaking and listening through tasks such as pair-work and group work. Reading and writing input includes focus on independent learning strategies. At level 5 you will be taught Korean via content-and-language integrated learning – you will study aspects of Korean cultures, communities and societies through the medium of Korean. You will learn through giving and listening to presentations, reading and discussing news articles. There will be discussion of independent learning strategies, weekly tests and formative feedback on writing. In your Year Abroad, if you study at a host university in Korea, you will study Korean language and culture, as well as modules relating to the English Language & Linguistics side of your programme. Our level 6 Korean language project modules use content-and-language integrated learning – you will learn through individual and/or group presentations, reading and discussion of authentic texts, and formative feedback on writing. You are expected to proactively engage with the language outside of class time at all levels. Korean modules are assessed with a combination of oral exam, videos, class tests and written work.

English Language & Linguistics

English Language & Linguistics modules are delivered using a mixture of lectures, workshops and seminars. Academic and research skills are embedded in modules, for example, academic writing and referencing, peer review, use of web based resources for document sharing, and the use of wikis and blogs. The assessment varies from module to module. There is an exam on LAL4004M *Descriptive Grammar of English* at level 4. Other assessment methods include essays, presentations, data analysis, online tests, peer reviews, blog posts and research proposals and reports.

Year Abroad and Work Experience

You will spend a year in Korea between level 5 and level 6. You will normally study abroad at one of our partner institutions. While studying abroad, you will take Korean language classes at your host university. You will also take courses, either taught in English or in Korean, that are relevant to the English Language & Linguistics side of your degree. You are expected to fully engage with the tuition and assessment, but your grades will not count towards your York St John credits.

At the end of your Year Abroad you will submit a *Reflective Report* LAL5017M. Through this module you will reflect on your Year Abroad with particular reference to how your experience relates to the modules you studied at level 4 and 5 and will go on to study at level 6. As part of this module you will also carry out 10 days of work experience. This addresses the University commitment to ensuring that graduates of York St John have worked towards the development of their own post-graduation careers.

Instead of a year studying abroad plus 10 days of work experience, it may alternatively be possible to you to do a year-long work placement while in Korea.

CELTA

You will have the opportunity to apply to take CELTA (Certificate in English Language Teaching to Speakers of Other Languages), an internationally-recognised English language teaching qualification. CELTA is awarded by Cambridge Assessment English, part of the University of Cambridge and is delivered as a four-week intensive course at York St John University. You have the opportunity to apply to take a CELTA course between level 5 and level 6, either before or after the Year Abroad, or, alternatively, at the end of level 6 up to a year after graduation. A place on the CELTA course is subject to a successful

application and interview, but, if successful, is funded by the School. CELTA includes theoretical input, tutorial support and consultation, supervised lesson planning, six hours assessed teaching practice, peer observation of teaching practice and observation of experienced teachers in the classroom.

Level 6

Level 6 modules challenge you to critically evaluate socio-cultural, psychological, political and/ or historical contexts of language use through independent study. You learn research and academic literacy skills across both Korean and English Language & Linguistics modules, enabling you to construct a convincing argument, evidenced by critical engagement with appropriate sources, both orally and in writing, and in both English and Korean. In the 40-credit dissertation module you conduct an independent research study of relevance to your programme, drawing on the research skills you have learned throughout the programme, and supported by additional skills sessions and up to six hours of one-on-one supervision.

Progression and graduation requirements

The University's general regulations for undergraduate awards apply to this programme.

Any modules that must be passed for progression or award are indicated in the Programme Structure section as non-compensatable.

The opportunity to participate in the Year Abroad is a privilege and is given at level 5 subject to meeting the following criteria:

- 1. Completion of at least 80% of non-assessed formative tasks in Korean language modules in semester 1 and semester 2.
- 2. At least 60% attendance across all three level 5 semester 1 modules (any lower than this means that meeting criteria 1 would not be possible by the end of semester 2)
- 3. A pass on all level 5 modules (after resit(s) where applicable)
- 4. At least a mark of 20 or above on all level 5 semester 1 modules at first attempt
- 5. At least a mark of 20 or above on all level 5 semester 2 modules at first attempt
- 6. No concerns under the Fitness to Study Policy that would prevent you from studying abroad
- 7. No breaches of the York St John Code of Discipline

In exceptional cases, if a student is not deemed suitable for study abroad, the University may not approve it. If you have otherwise met the requirements to progress to level 6, but have not met the criteria for the Year Abroad, it will usually be possible to transfer to through the Change of Programme procedure a course which does not contain a study abroad element, most likely *English Language and Linguistics*.

Progression to level 6 at the end of the Year Abroad is determined by the pass/fail module LAL5017M *Reflective Report.* In the exceptional case of a student not completing the Year Abroad, progression to level 6 is not possible on this programme. In this exceptional case, you would transfer to a programme which does not contain Japanese at level 6, most likely *English Language and Linguistics*.

In special circumstances where the students are not able to study abroad due to external factors (e.g. virus pandemic, war, political conflict), students will be consulted and may be able stay on this programme without going to study abroad.
