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### Introduction and special features

This two-week course is designed for international students to participate in virtually. Each day is made up of a combination of 'asynchronous' teaching, where you listen to recorded sessions and take part in group and individual activities, and 'synchronous' (i.e., live online) teaching delivered by supportive and experienced tutors.

If you are an international student, this course is for you, whatever your first language and whatever your English language level. If your first language is not English, we only require that you have some previous experience of English language study.

On the course, you will share and explore different cultures and ways of communicating, learn about a contemporary and/or historical culture, and discuss contemporary issues. Through individual, group and whole-class activities on these topics, you will gain confidence in your writing and spoken presentation skills.

## Learning, teaching and assessment

Each day will be divided into two halves. First you will take part in 2.5 hours of 'asynchronous' teaching, where you listen to recorded sessions and do group and individual activities. This is followed by 2.5 hours of 'synchronous' (i.e., live online) teaching where you will take part in communicative and task-based activities. You will receive a mixture of individual, group and peer feedback on your writing and spoken presentation skills through the course.

At the beginning of the course you will take part in a short skills test. This is so that we can tailor the course to your needs. The assessments are a written composition and a video presentation. These will be assessed against the learning outcomes and will take your initial skills test into consideration.
