Introduction and special features

This four-year degree in Korean, TESOL & linguistics – which includes a year in Korea – gives you the skills you need to teach English in Korea and around the world. The programme is designed to give you communicative Korean language skills, a deep understanding of Korean culture, theories and methods for teaching English in a multilingual world, and broad expertise in linguistics too.

You can enter this programme as a beginner in Korean. You can also enter if you have studied Korean before and/or if you have any qualifications in Korean, as long as you do not already have B1 level or above of the Common European Framework for Languages (CEFR). Through the programme, you will progress from talking about yourself and your routine to using your Korean flexibly in a variety of social, academic and professional contexts. Through the study of TESOL, you will learn how languages are learned and how to set goals in TESOL teaching, discussing different teaching methods and how to motivate English language learners in a range of TESOL contexts. The opportunity to take the internationally-recognised teaching qualification, CELTA, is included, subject to successful interview.

Through the study of linguistics, you will learn how speech is articulated, how language is structured and related to meaning, how it relates to speakers' intentions and purposes in social interaction, social attitudes to language, and the way language choices can express identities and cultural values.

Special features:

- Start Korean from beginners no need to have studied Korean, or any other language, before
- Study abroad between level 5 and level 6 study Korean for two years before going abroad
- Take the CELTA (Certificate in English Language Teaching to Speakers of Other Languages), the
 internationally recognised English language teaching qualification awarded by Cambridge
 Assessment English, part of the University of Cambridge, subject to successful interview take this

- Gain TESOL experience through community programmes: YESOL (York: English speakers of Other Languages) and YEAL (York: English as an Additional Language)

Admissions criteria

You must meet the minimum entry requirements which are published on the programme specific webpage. If your first language is not English, you need to take an IELTS test or an equivalent qualification accepted by the University (see https://www.yorksj.ac.uk/international/how-to-apply/english-language-requirements/).

If you do not have traditional qualifications, you may be eligible for entry on the basis of <u>Recognition of prior</u> <u>learning (RPL)</u>. We also consider applications for entry with advanced standing.

Programme aim(s)

By the end of the programme, successful students will reach upper B2/C1 level on the Common European Framework for Languages (CEFR) in Korean. You will be able to have conversations, give presentations, join in discussions, read articles and reports, and write coherently, communicating effectively for a range of academic, social and professional purposes. You will have the skills and expertise to be an independent, ethical and reflective TESOL professional in Korea or around the World.

Please note that not all options will be available every year as they depend on student demand and staff availability.

Learning, teaching and assessment

Korean

This programme is designed for beginners in Korean. We use a communicative Korean teaching style at level 4, teaching speaking and listening through tasks such as pair-work and group work. Reading and writing input includes focus on independent learning strategies. At level 5 you will be taught Korean via a range of strategies which may include content-and-language integrated learning – you will study aspects of Korean cultures, communities and societies through the medium of Korean and English. You will learn through giving and listening to presentations, reading and discussing news articles. There will be discussion of independent learning strategies, weekly tests and formative feedback on writing. In your Year Abroad, if you study at a host university in Korea, you will study Korean language and culture, as well as modules relating to the Intercultural Communication & Linguistics side of your programme. Our level 6 Korean language project modules make use of a range of learning and teaching strategies which may include content-and-language integrated learning – you will study academic and professional Korean through topics on Korean cultures, communities and societies. You will learn through individual and/or group presentations, reading and discussion of authentic texts, and formative feedback on writing. You are expected to proactively engage with the language outside of class time at all levels.

Korean modules are assessed with a combination of oral exam, videos, class tests and written work. In addition, if you wish you can take the Test of Proficiency in Korean Test for no extra fee at level 6.

We also provide opportunities for you to take part in extra-curricular activities related to Korean language and culture: the vibrant student-run Korean Society, where you can experience Korean culture and meet home and exchange students, an essay competition hosted by the Korean Embassy, and staff-led activities by such as the Korean day festival and/or trips to Korean cultural events.

TESOL & Linguistics

TESOL & Linguistics modules are delivered using a mixture of lectures, workshops and seminars. Academic and research skills are embedded in modules, for example, academic writing and referencing, peer review, use of web-based resources for document sharing, and the use of wikis and blogs. The assessment varies from module to module. There is an exam on 1LL303 Descriptive Grammar of English at level 4. Other assessment methods include essays, presentations, data analysis, online tests, peer reviews, blog posts and research proposals and reports.

Year Abroad and Work Experience

You will spend a year in Korea between level 5 and level 6. You will normally study abroad at one of our partner institutions. While studying abroad, you will take Korean language classes at your host university. You will also take courses, either taught in English or in Korean, that are relevant to the TESOL & Linguistics side of your degree. You are expected to fully engage with the tuition and assessment, but your grades will not count towards your York St John credits.

At the end of your Year Abroad you will submit a *Reflective Report* LAL5017M. Through this module you will reflect on your Year Abroad with particular reference to how your experience relates to the modules you studied at level 4 and 5 and will go on to study at level 6. As part of this module you will also carry out 10 days of work experience. This addresses the University commitment to ensuring that graduates of York St John have worked towards the development of their own post-graduation careers.

Instead of a year studying abroad plus 10 days of work experience, it may alternatively be possible to you to do a year-long work placement while in Korea.

If you fail LAL5024M or choose not to study abroad, you may transfer to the exit award BA (Hons) Linguistics and TESOL with Korean. For this award, PLOs 5.7 and 5.8 do not apply.

CELTA

You will have the opportunity to apply to take CELTA (Certificate in English Language Teaching to Speakers of Other Languages), an internationally-recognised English language teaching qualification. CELTA is awarded by Cambridge Assessment English, part of the University of Cambridge as is delivered as a four-week intensive course at York St John University. You have the opportunity to apply to take a CELTA course between level 5 and level 6, either before or after the Year Abroad, or, alternatively, at the end of level 6 before you graduate. A place on the CELTA course is subject to a successful application and interview, but, if successful, is funded by the School. CELTA includes theoretical input, tutorial support and consultation, supervised lesson planning, 6 hours assessed teaching practice, peer observation of teaching practice and observation of experienced teachers in the classroom.

Level 6

Level 6 modules challenge you to critically evaluate language teaching methods in global multilingual contexts through independent study. You will learn research and academic literacy skills across both Korean and TESOL & Linguistics modules, enabling you to construct a convincing argument, evidenced by critical engagement with appropriate sources, both orally and in writing, and in both English and Korean. In the 40-credit dissertation module you conduct an independent research study of relevance to your programme, drawing on the research skills you have learned throughout the programme, and supported by additional skills sessions and up to six hours of one-on-one supervision.

Progression and graduation requirements

The University's general regulations for undergraduate awards apply to this programme.

Any modules that must be passed for progression or award are indicated in the Programme Structure section as non-compensatable.

In addition, the following programme-specific regulations apply in respect of progression and graduation.

The opportunity to participate in the Year Abroad is a privilege and approval will be given during level 4 and 5 subject to meeting the following criteria:

- 1. At least 70% attendance in Japanese modules, and across all six level 4 semester 1 and semester 2 modules.
- 2. At least 50% attendance across all three level 4 semester 1 modules (any lower than this means that meeting criteria 1 would not be possible by the end of semester 2)
- 3. At least 80% attendance in Korean modules, and across all six level 5 semester 1 and semester 2 modules
- 4. At least 60% attendance across all three level 5 semester 1 modules (any lower than this means that meeting criteria 3 would not be possible by the end of semester 2)
- 5. To have met the university requirements for progression to level 6 by the end of level 5 (at first attempt for semester 2 modules), in accordance with the University's general regulations for undergraduate awards and confirmed at the semester 2 examination board
- 6. No concerns have arisen under the Fitness to Study Policy that would prevent you from studying abroad
- 7. No breaches of the York St John Student Disciplinary Policy

8. Successful completion of study abroad application process leading to acceptance by a host institution.

Students who do not pass one or more semester two modules may be able to change programme or suspend study and reapply for study abroad the following year, once the conditions for progression according to the University's general regulations for undergraduate awards have been met for level 5 modules during the summer resit period.

At level 5 if you do not meet the requirements to progress to the Year Abroad and fail the 0 credits module 'LAL5024M Proceed to Study Abroad' but you have met the general University progression standards to progress to level 6 and have passed the non-compensatable level 5 language modules (LAK5001M and LAK5002M) you will be transferred to level 6 of BA (Hons) Linguistics and TESOL with Korean. If you have not passed both LAK5001M and LAK5002M it will usually be possible to transfer through the Change of Programme procedure to a course which does not require a pass in both of these modules, most likely English Language, Linguistics and TESOL.

Progression to level 6 at the end of the Year Abroad is determined by the pass/fail module LAL5017M *Reflective Report.* In the exceptional case of a student not completing the Year Abroad, progression to level 6 is not possible on this programme. In this exceptional case, you would transfer to a programme which does not contain Korean at level 6, most likely *English Language, Linguistics and TESOL*.

In special circumstances where the students are not able to study abroad due to external factors (e.g. virus pandemic, war, political conflict), students will be consulted and may be able stay on this programme without going to study abroad.
