Introduction and Special Features

This unique Musical Theatre offer places an emphasis on acting, singing and music making, dance and choreography, devising skills, and making new work that has aesthetic and social significance. It will ignite creativity, inspire, and equip innovative, original and compassionate musical theatre makers of the future. As a student on this programme, you will focus on creating and performing musical theatre as soloists, ensemble practitioners and community performance practitioners. You will sing, dance, act, devise and compose musical theatre in a whole range of professional contexts. The course will follow the main characteristics of the School of the Arts, which are:

- Creating (making and doing)
- Research embedded in teaching (intellectually generous, curious and rigorous)
- Social engagement (promoting fairness, challenging prejudice)

Whilst studying this Musical Theatre degree, you will 'do' your art, and create new work that has significance and impact on the communities that receive and engage with it. You will encounter, to a greater of lesser extent, engagement with your practice in the context of society, where reflection of your place in the world is considered in light of social and environmental justice. Similarly, staff research is not carried out in isolation of the students and the programmes but rather is often intrinsically linked, so that staff and students benefit from this shared curiosity.

Central to the teaching and learning of BA Musical Theatre is the understanding (physically, intellectually and emotionally) of what is required in the creation of a work, which is composite and resonant with meanings for an audience. The creation, composition, performance and documentation of work occur within a strong sense of social engagement, i.e. these pieces that you create have a purpose. You will develop your learning through the 'feeling-thinking-action' loop concurrently with critical enquiry, contextual awareness and self-motivation, summed up by the term 'enquiry-based learning'. Our graduates are versatile performers and musical theatre creators who will have the skillset to work within and for a wide variety of contexts that make a direct impact on our communities within both the commercial and educational sectors.

As a student, you will work, create and study alongside the tutors placing yourself at the centre of your own learning through the creation of live works for public consumption, field trips, meeting and working with various 'community' groups and creating documents. You will be taught through lectures, seminars in small groups, practical workshops, tutorials, peer-to-peer learning, performing in public contexts, ethnographic field trips and visiting guest artists. You will have regular extra-curricular dance technique classes in a range of styles including contemporary and jazz – the styles depend on student demand and global significance to dance and musical theatre. These classes will be shared with dance students from across all courses in the Performance department, thus enhancing the sense of community across all courses. Singing lessons will support your vocal skills and strengthen your performance abilities and confidence.

Classes and performances will take place in the newly built Creative Centre, which will provide professional and purpose-built learning spaces for all of our Performance students at York St John. The centre is set to become a major cultural player in York and will be one of the most significant cultural venues in the city. Musical Theatre students will use the following spaces within the Creative Centre:

- The Performance Space
 - o This 180 seat venue provides a performance space right in the heart of York, opening up many opportunities to form partnerships with music and community organisations and creatives in the City of York and beyond. It has been acoustically designed to accommodate many different musical styles and performing contexts, with a Steinway piano and a full theatrical rig for lights and sound. It will regularly host lunchtime and evening concerts, music, musical theatre and drama rehearsals and shows. This will be an incredible space where all our students can show their work publicly to potential funders and agents and professional networks. It will also mean that visiting professionals can share their touring work, as well as provide workshops and Q&A sessions that are highly valuable for our students if they are to connect with professional networks.
- The Workshop
 - The Workshop is adjacent to the Performance Space and has shower facilities, making it an excellent dual-purpose facility. This space will also host many of our community activities that offer our students professional work placements as creative artists.
- The Atrium
 - The atrium is the full height of the building making it an excellent space to promote the Performance Space programme to the wider University community and visitors from York and beyond. It will host a pop-up box office for the Performance Space and many other exciting site-specific events created by our students.
- The Recital Room
 - This beautiful room will showcase the work of our small groups and soloists in Music and Musical Theatre. It has a piano and capacity for up to 50, with a balcony with views to the Minster and will be one of the most stunning small venues in York – perfect for showcases and networking.
- Music Practice Rooms
 - These soundproof music practice rooms will be bookable for all students studying on all music routes and have been designed with needs of music and musical theatre students in mind.
- Band rooms

 Each band room supports the group rehearsals for our students and one of these rooms serves and a high-tech recording studio where students can record and produce their own music.

The Performance Department staff team have decades of experience in delivering theatre and music degrees. Staff will encourage you to expand creatively and learn to create new work. A collaborative ethos underpins everything at YSJ, and you are taught to think on your feet, solve problems, engage in critical thinking, and research through practice. This will prepare you for your career and life beyond university.

YSJ is proud of the commitment to engaging with social, political and environmental issues through performance, and the course is designed to give opportunities for you to explore musical theatre in the immediate, and wider, community. You will have the opportunity to study abroad for one semester and will regularly take part in concert trips, external performances and educational visits. These may include, for example, trips to Paris and to the Edinburgh Fringe. There may be an additional cost for these trips.

This BA (Hons) Musical Theatre programme at York St John University is based on the following fundamental ideas:

- 1. Situated in the Performance suite, this is a programme for all musical theatre specialists, regardless of genre, style, or discipline. It focuses on your development as a self-reliant, creative practitioner.
- 2. This programme situates students' experience first and therefore places you at the centre of the learning experience.
- 3. All performative, creative and critical practices on the programme are integrated within current research. All staff are research active, and you will be engaged in that research, alongside peers, postgraduate researchers, and staff; practising and collaborating alongside each other.
- 4. All performative, creative and critical practices on the programme are considered through a pedagogic lens. A critical understanding of how learning occurs in musical theatre contexts is embedded in activities.
- 5. All performative, creative and critical practices on the programme are professionalised. The development of your employability and appropriate transferable skills are highlighted in all aspects of the programme, and work-related learning experiences are integrated into modules.
- 6. All performative, creative and critical practices on the programme are situated within wider societal contexts. Theory and practice are considered in terms of public engagement with cultural and ethical issues.

Admissions criteria

You must meet the minimum entry requirements which are published on the programme specific webpage.

If your first language is not English, you need to take an IELTS test or an equivalent qualification accepted by the University (see https://www.yorksj.ac.uk/international/how-to-apply/english-language-requirements/).

If you do not have traditional qualifications, you may be eligible for entry on the basis of <u>Recognition of prior</u> <u>learning (RPL)</u>. We also consider applications for entry with advanced standing.

3. as professional musical theatre practitioners, performers and makers who positively impact the communities they may serve locally, nationally and globally.

Learning, teaching and assessment

Whilst on the BA (Hons) Musical Theatre, you will learn through experience. This is achieved by direct engagement with practical activity in musical theatre, theatre and dance, and through considered reflection on experiences and the key theories which underpin that practice.

Teaching activities are student-centred, putting your needs and the quality of experience first. At levels 5 and 6 there is an increased focus on the development of artistic specialisms, professional values, and on graduate employability.

All current research is integrated into the learning and teaching and embedded in activities is a critical understanding of how learning occurs in musical theatre contexts. On the staff teaching team we have artists who have written and produced full length musical theatre works. We have a range of partners, including York Theatre Royal, Converge, Prisons Partnership, International Centre for Community Music and many other artists who we work closely with in York community who our researchers create work with and generate many opportunities for our students to have placement work. Nearly all of these partners have been developed through the international research of our lecturing teams and our students benefit from their research expertise and intern opportunities as well as experiencing this new impactful work within the curriculum. There are many opportunities for our students to gain placements or work-based experience with our partners or on professional projects run by our staff team. These opportunities can range from understudying in professional theatre with a public matinee performance, gaining a graduate prize where your work is mentored by York Theatre Royal, facilitating creative work within schools, possibly towards public showcases and festivals, or gaining paid experience on a project as a student intern.

You will have an academic tutor, and tutorial support is available in all modules. There are no formal examinations. Assessment takes place through the submission of coursework: including essays, reflective writing, portfolios, and live events such as performances, presentations and placements.

Course Activities to Enhance the Teaching and Learning Experience

At every level BA (Hons) Musical Theatre allows the opportunity for you to engage in activities across modules and beyond the classroom. Noted below are examples of course activities that enhance your learning experience.

- Create and Co-Create festivals: you will get the opportunity to be part of these festivals through the Professional Production, Repertoire and Company modules;
- Performing House: individual artists and companies perform here on campus in the University's own Theatre. This gives you an opportunity to see the very best theatre work touring the UK. In addition, some artists offer Q&A sessions, tutorials or workshops with our students. All events are accessible through the on-line store;
- Field trips: There are module, level or programme specific field trips. We are aware though, in the current world situation, that guaranteeing trips is no longer possible.

The learning activities that you will take part in during your time on the degree will also present the opportunity to accumulate a set of skills which are highly valuable to employers; creativity, teamwork, the ability to collaborate, contextual awareness, problem solving, independence, and the ability to meet deadlines. In Level 4, early in your academic career, you will be asked to compile an audit of transferable

skills you already have, then to consider what is your long-term career plan and construct other skills you need to acquire and where on the programme you can get them.
