Marking scale and conventions

For all taught awards approved by York St John University under its own degree awarding powers, 1.5 the marking scale is a 0-100¹ scale as set out in the table below:

- The maximum mark that can be achieved for reassessed work is normally the pass mark, except for qualified fails where the original mark is awarded on successful completion of the failed work.
- 1.7 The University marking scale is complemented by Generic Assessment Descriptors.
- 1.8 Credits awarded or recognised by the University may count only once for the purpose of progression and award. Work submitted for one module may not be submitted for another module.
- 1.9 There are separate supporting procedures for submitting, marking and returning assessed work, which includes information on late work, exceptional circumstances, overlength work, deadlines, timings and confidentiality. Policy information can be found in the Code of Practice for Assessment.

Language of tuition and assessment

1.10 The language of instruction and assessment for all taught programmes of study of York St John University is English except where the subject content dictates that a part of the programme is delivered in a language other than English.

¹ The University uses a judgemental grading scale for assessment unless otherwise specified. A judgemental grading scale is one in which a single final holistic grade for the submitted work is determined solely through the academic judgement of the marker. Where specified, a formulaic grading scale may be used. A formulaic grading scale is one in which the marker allocates a numeric grade against threshold criteria based on the standard of performance of the learner, where the single final grade for the submitted work is the scaled cumulative total of the grades scored against each of the individual threshold criteria. Both judgemental and formulaic grading use a 0-100 scale.

² In the case of programmes from which transfer to a Masters programme is possible, a candidate is expected to achieve an overall Master's

pass mark in a specified number of modules before recommendation for a transfer may be made.

³ An undergraduate module in a postgraduate programme passed at this level will count for credit.

Age on entry

- 1.11 Before commencing studies for a taught award of York St John University, candidates must normally have reached a minimum of 17 years of age.
- 1.12 A candidate who has reached the age of 17 but not 18 on the first day of the month in which their programme of study commences will not be admitted except with the express permission of the Academic Registrar and with the written authorisation of their parent or guardian. Such students must turn 18 within their first semester of study.

Periods of study

- 1.13 The standard periods of study for York St John University awards are defined in the <u>Regulations</u> for <u>Undergraduate Awards</u>, the <u>Regulations for Taught Postgraduate Awards</u>, the <u>Regulations for Professional Doctorate Awards</u>, the <u>Regulations for Master or Research Degree Awards</u> and the <u>Regulations for Research Degree Awards</u>. Where specified in a <u>programme specification</u>, the duration of a programme of study may vary from the standard period.
- 1.14 Where a student is, for good reason, not able to continue as expected, a request may be made for a suspension of enrolment. Permission for a suspension to the period of study may be granted under procedures set out in the <u>Suspension of Studies Policy for Taught Degrees</u> or the <u>Code of</u> <u>Practice for Research Degrees</u>.
- 1.15 Students must complete all study and assessments within 24 months following the standard period of study set out in the Regulations for Undergraduate Awards, the Regulations for Taught

 Postgraduate Awards, the Regulations for Professional Doctorate Awards, the Regulations for Master or Research Degree Awards or in the programme specification. Except with the special approval of the Special Cases Panel, a sub-Committee of the University Assessment Board (UAB), or where a student has taken a period of suspension under the Parental Leave policy, this constitutes the maximum period allowed for completion. Further information can be found in Section 18 of the Code of Practice for Assessment.

Sabbatical officers

- 1.16 Any appointees to an office deemed to have sabbatical status must be enrolled as a full time student at the University at the point in which they were elected to office.
- 1.17 No person shall hold sabbatical office (or offices) for more than two academic years, whether consecutively or in total.
- 1.18 Students suspending their programme of study to take up a sabbatical position may only suspend for one academic year. The period of suspension shall be discounted in calculating the time elapsed on the programme of study.

Aegrotat and posthumous awards

1.19 Criteria for awarding an aegrotat award or a posthumous award can be found in the Aegrotat and Posthumous Awards section of the <u>Code of Practice for Assessment</u>.

Withholding and withdrawing awards

1.20 The University reserves the right to withhold and/or withdraw awards where individual students have not fulfilled all the requirements for award or are subsequently found not to have fulfilled the requirements, including where academic misconduct is proven following the conferral of an award.

Variations

- 1.21 Any change to these regulations needs the explicit approval of the Academic Board.
- 1.22 Any variation to these regulations for an individual student needs the prior express permission of the *relevant committee*.
