ENSEMBLE DRAMA AND DANCE


Literally meaning 'They shall not pass!', *No Pasarán* is an anti-fascist performance that responds to themes and stories of the Spanish Civil War.

This devised performance began with visual stimuli that included Pablo Picasso's painting 'Guernica' and photographic documents of the fight against fascism in Spain in the 1930s.

Level 1 Drama & Dance students have created a powerful memorial to the images of Civil War in order to draw comparisons to contemporary struggles including the atrocities of Aleppo in Syria.

PROJECT SWORD

NORTHERN SIX THEATRE

'It was in those moments that everything came back. The fallen, the remembered and the present.'

Comprised of six artists from the north of England, Northern6 focuses their work on the exploration of specific events, and the personal narratives that occur within. Using oral history as a stimulus, they aim to retell these stories in such a way that does not re-enact the events, but rather the performance is inspired by them. Coming from diverse interests in theatre, ranging from scenographic design to the exploration of narrative practice, this enables the company to reinterpret these events and retell them in creative and unique ways.

In 2017 the York branch of the Normandy Veterans association laid up their standard, this is the year that Northern 6 pay homage to the soldiers that fell on the 6th of June, 1944. This project was devised as a response to our company's research into war, specifically the Sword Beach landings. Following five fictional soldiers, and one wife at home, *Project Sword* aims to show different aspects of war through this interesting gender ratio and pay homage to the fallen and their families.

'But just remember, don't try and be a hero, because you'll always be a hero in my eyes.'

'It was in those moments that everything came back. The fallen, the remembered and the present.'



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I DON'T THINK YOU'RE READY

TAGGED THEATRE

Performed by four women, *I Don't Think You're Ready* takes a stylistic approach to exploring the taboos and stigmas of body image. By investigating the autobiographical and ethnographic elements that have inspired us, we have been able to collate personal narratives, pop culture references and a plethora of materials to utilise in the performance space.

Determined to reclaim the space as our own, we aim to empower through the playfulness of our images without falling into the male gaze; therefore, protecting ourselves from any ideological traps that present themselves within our process.

We have conducted a series of workshops within a youth theatre, to gain an insight into the current societal pressures that surround young people. Due to popular culture and advancements in social media. we believe body image has become a trend for the younger generation. We are interested in exploring the differences between the pressures they face today, and the things we considered to be pressures in our childhood. This research aided our material-making, as well as exploring influential performance artists such as Bryony Kimmings, Victoria Wood and Hollie McNish.

As a company, we are interested in interrogating what it means to be the 'perfect' woman – emphasising on body image issues and myths that we all face in modern society. Contrary to popular beliefs, body image is not a trend and is an issue that we want to begin a conversation about.

Our piece will begin with an exhibition that we encourage the audience to attend before witnessing the main body of the work. The exhibition will showcase the good, the bad and the ugly hidden truths of body image, in hope that it will inform and provoke a reaction from the audience before entering the performance space.

Through the aesthetics and poetics of the stage and the use of different materials, we have created an empowering and thought-provoking piece that will enable conversation.

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DO NOT CUT THE FLOW OF KINDNESS

BANSHEE THEATRE


Banshee performance are an all-female theatre company. Embracing their inner banshee they use song, dance and autobiographical experiences to tackle the daily struggles that women face. The four women invite you to witness their performance of *Do not Cut the Flow of Kindness from Me* which analyses the personal reflections of what it means to be a woman and how they are treated.

They are real, they are unapologetic and they can scream like banshees. They refuse to live in a world where women have to hold keys between their fingers, buy rape alarms in the shape of lipsticks, and are told to see catcalling as a compliment. The performance is raw, hard hitting and is designed to push boundaries, challenge stereotypes and stigmas. Above all, it asks why women are still being silenced in their time of need.

Banshee Performance uses kindness and intimacy to cut through the endless torture that women face every single day. This performance will not be sweetened to your taste.

This performance will challenge bigotry. This performance will not be easy. This performance will liberate.

BARE

CUTTING CLOUDS

BARE is an action based performance that layers aspects of the life and death of writer Virginia Woolf over environments that we are exploring. Equally, the landscape that we are experiencing feeds through and contaminates our personal responses to the icon of Woolf.

We explore place in relation to the concept of three using walking, waiting and wading to filter our responses. We aim to investigate humanity within the landscape, creating a presence in the outside world.

BARE contaminates the external and becomes an extension of the performers as a gift to those sharing the environment with us; whether invited or accidental.

We will be performing BARE on Friday 12th May.
